Originally the stables of this hillside farm it is within an easy drive of Newgale beach and the quieter coves of the north Pembrokeshire coast. The village pub is just a mile away.

This exceptional, detached stone cottage has been imaginatively converted retaining many interesting original features. In addition to A-framed timbered ceilings it has a delightful double bedroom with arrowslit windows and a large window looking out over the Preseli Hills. Extensive lawned garden with furniture

Conveniently located the large, sandy beach of Newgale and the rocky coves to the north are within an easy drive as are the facilities in the vibrant market town of Haverfordwest. A delightful rural retreat.

The bedroom in Stable Cottage has one double bed suitable for two people.

National Park:

The Pembrokeshire Coast National Park, one of Britain's breathing spaces, takes in about a third of the county including the entire coastal strip, the upper reaches of the Daugleddau (two swords) and the Preseli's. Its the only National Park that is almost all coastal.

Coast Path:

Castles:

There are 51 forts and castles in Pembrokeshire including enormous stone fortresses like Pembroke castle, Manorbier castle, and Carew castle. There are medieval and walled towns of Tenby and Pembroke and fortified Bishop Palaces at St Davids and Lamphey.

Wildlife:

A pristine environment, clean seas, very little population and lush vegetation makes for rich and varied habitats, most important of which are the islands: Skomer, Skokholm, Ramsey, Grassholm and Caldey. Home of thousands of Puffins, Gannets and other sea birds. Dolphin, Porpoise and whale watching boat trips are popular too.



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
